Information outlined above is part of the Federal Flag Code (<u>Flag Code</u>) or enacted by Federal legislation. Fly your POW/MIA flag with your United States flag on Armed Forces Day; Memorial Day; Flag Day, Independence Day, National POW/MIA Recognition Day and Veterans Day.

Observations at High School, College and Professional sporting events reveal that there are far too many sports fans talking, texting, laughing, playing and moving about during the Flag ceremonies, including the National Anthem.
